Superintendent Profile

Matthew Turner's first job was as a Greenskeeper at Four Seasons Golf Course at the age of 16 and he has remained in the golf course industry ever since, now going on 20 years. Matt graduated from Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) in 1996 with a Bachelor's degree in Business Management. He also graduated from Rutgers in 1999 with a 2 year certificate in Turfgrass Management. After 12 years of tenure at Four Seasons, he moved to the Wintergreen Resort in Virginia to take his first superintendents job working for 6 years at Devils Knob Golf Course. In 2006, he took the superintendent position at Conestoga Country Club, which moved him back to his hometown. He has been married for 11 years to Michele, and they have 3 children: Gabriela (7) and twins Matthew and Makenzie (3). Moving back home gave him and his wife the opportunity to play more golf with plenty of babysitters nearby and reuniting with friends and family.

Course Profile

Conestoga Country Club was built in 1948 by the membership. This club was formed by a group of members who played at the Overlook Golf Course. After purchasing the land from the proceeds of a bowling alley, this group hired William Gordon as the architect for this course. He guided the membership on how to build the golf course with their time and equipment. They formed a private club, whose original name was Overlook Country Club. But after six months, they changed it to Conestoga Country Club, named after a creek running one mile across the property. Little Conestoga Creek winds through both front 9 and back 9, coming into play on 6 holes. During that time, William Gordon was famous for building bowled greens which were designed to hold water where irrigation was insufficient. In the fall of 2006, Golf Preservation Inc. installed drainages in all 19 greens to alleviate the problematic bowled greens. They are now in the process of building an irrigation pond to be supplied with well water to avoid using Little Conestoga Creek as the water source.

Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Don't You Love The Weather?

It's difficult to produce regional updates without first discussing the weather. What makes this season so interesting are the weather patterns in the different parts of the Mid-Atlantic Region. There are parts of this region that are extremely dry. Conversely, there are other parts of the Mid-Atlantic region that are on the opposite end of the spectrum and are very wet. A few miles can make a huge difference in how much rainfall golf courses receive or do not receive.

Problems begin to develop with each scenario. For example, with hot and dry weather, patches of Poa trivialis (a common contaminant in grass seed) go dormant. The result is a patch of bare ground. Is the Poa trivialis dead? Probably not, it will come back when temperatures moderate in the fall. Nonetheless, the turf looks bad and golfers question, "what happened?"

The other extreme is Pythium. Pythium is a water mold and its development is favored by free water on the soil surface. The result of a Pythium attack is another patch of bare ground. Thus, while one superintendent may be fighting the dry wilt of Poa trivialis and Poa annua, another superintendent is fighting Pythium, brown patch and wet wilt.

August also is the month that many courses implement aggressive renovation work. Labor is still available, especially college kids, a high percentage of golfers are away on vacation, and it may be too hot for other golfers to play. With lighter play schedules and no tournaments, many golf courses use this time to core aerate, slice and overseed,

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

apply heavy rates of topdressing, etc. Be careful; the last thing anyone wants to do is to make an otherwise good stand of grass worse. Watch the weather and adjust renovation work accordingly. You need to make the judgment about when to be aggressive and when to be conservative. After all, this is the time of the year when cool-season grasses are at their weakest.

Another problem we are seeing is weeds. Breakthroughs with preemerge herbicides are common; for example, warm-season grassy weeds like yellow nutsedge, kyllinga and dallisgrass. Remember, when cool-season grasses are at their weakest, herbicides should only be applied when there is good moisture in the soil. Herbicides applied to drought stressed grass do not kill the weeds very well and you run the risk of damaging the grass you are trying to maintain.

What's the bottom line? Be careful and either pray for rain or pray for it to stop raining. It has been that kind of year!!!

Directions to Conestoga Country Club

From Harrisburg:

Take PA-283 East toward Airport/Lancaster. Take the PA-741 East exit toward McGovernsville/Rohrerstown, ramp becomes PA-741. Turn Left onto Stone Mill Road. Turn Right into Conestoga Country Club.

From York:

Take US-30 East. Take the Millersville/Rohrerstown/PA-741 exit. Turn Right onto PA-741 East. Turn Left onto Stone Mill Road. Turn Right into Conestoga Country Club.

From Reading:

Take US-222 South. Merge onto US-30 West Lancaster/York. Take the PA-741 exit. Turn Left onto PA-741/Rohrerstown Road. Continue to follow PA-741. Turn Left onto Stone Mill Road. Turn Right into Conestoga Country Club.

From Philadelphia:

Take PA Turnpike West to Exit 286, US-222/Reading/Lancaster. Merge onto US-222 South via the ramp on the Left. Merge onto US-30 West toward Lancaster/York. Take the PA-741 exit. Turn Left onto PA-741/Rohrerstown Road. Continue to follow PA-741. Turn Left onto Stone Mill Road. Turn Right into Conestoga Country Club.


From Baltimore:

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Heather and Gorse

I think I'm starting to rethink the image that I'm portraying to my children over the past few years. The other day, my eldest son Zach, came home from the library with a special present for me. It seems he ran across a book named <u>Guinness: The 250 Year Search For The Perfect Pour,</u> and immediately thought of me!!! I must say that I'm a bit perplexed on how to take the gesture. On one hand, it was extremely thoughtful and he was obviously proud of the find, as well as the excitement I showed regarding his presentation of this very special book. On the other hand, it is a rather grim reminder that our children are excellent observers of our own behavior. I suspect that this scenario could easily become a long term case study, especially considering my parents rarely if ever drank alcohol in front of my brothers, my sister and I. Whether this influenced me not drink much prior to my freshmen year in college... maybe. So congratulations to everyone in the region for making it through the dog days of August! Looking at the date, we are beyond the mythical hump date of August 15th, which signifies the beginning of the end of another golf season. While I know my memory is fading fast, along with many other things in my world, I seem to remember a time not too long ago when August 15th was a more significant line in the sand marking the end to the majority of the summer stress. Of course, my fading memory tells me that not too long ago the maintenance standards were a bit more relaxed in that greens weren't being shaved down below 0.125" and fairways and tees weren't being mowed below 0.400", so I guess it may all be relative.

August, while normally not my favorite month of the year, certainly takes center stage every four years in our lives due to the Summer Olympic Games. If you're a sports fan, the past two weeks were an insomniac's dream. As a closet insomniac anyway, I watched more athletic events from 2 AM to 5 AM in the past two weeks than ever before in my life. This was my twelfth Olympics as a casual observer and sports fan. Of course, that is assuming that my parents had the television on back in 1964 and 1968. I'm not sure these should count, but at my age I feel like I lived through the sixties, even though I may have lived through them in diapers!

In actuality, the first Olympics I remember watching as a kid were the 1972 Munich Olympic Games. The three things I remember about those games were Mark Spitz winning all his races, the USA Basketball team losing to the USSR, and the Israeli hostage crisis (with the recently passed Jim McKay reporting for ABC). Regarding Mark Spitz and his seven gold medals; at the time I was very young and stupid and really didn't understand why that was such an awesome feat at the time. As for the USA basketball team's loss; I remember being mad, probably because my older brothers and my Dad were mad about the controversial finish, but again, I didn't understand politics, the Cold War, and the symbolism of the rest of the world finally catching up to the USA in this All-American sport. The hostage crisis was just an eye opening tragedy that was a grim reminder of a world that the majority of people living in the USA didn't know. What a difference a few decades or three or three and one half can make!??!

The 2008 Beijing Olympics were most likely the most amazing world introduction to a relatively unknown and mysterious city/country in history. More amazing I find is how he began swimming at the age of seven and by the age of eleven, his Mother was told that she had to decide whether to allow him to go on to become an Olympian or to back away and just be a kid. No pressure there Mom! Looking back, I guess she made the right decision. And to further illustrate his impact, the other day at the pool to which we belong, I observed several kids attempting the butterfly stroke and pretending to be just like Mike!

Other top memories revolve around the USA "Redeem" team in men's basketball, the USA women's softball team losing for the first time ever, the USA men's volleyball team taking home the gold, the USA men's and women's 4x100 meter relay

teams both dropping the baton in the prelims (OUCH), the men's and women's USA beach volleyball teams each winning the gold, and the USA women's soccer team winning the gold. I think the older I get the more I appreciate the time, the effort, the dedication, and the focus that is required to succeed in the Olympics. One bad race, one miscalculation, one mistake, or even some bad luck and Olympic dreams can be dashed faster than you can say Synchronized Swimming five times fast! And while other competitions will come and go, for many athletes, the Olympic window of opportunity is rather small.

All the competitions considered and as impressive as Michael Phelps was throughout the swimming competition, as for my personal number one Olympic memory, interesting it is that my top memory doesn't involve the USA at all. Enter into the picture one Usain Bolt from Jamaica. He is the newest "fastest man in the world," winning three gold medals and setting three world records in the process. This guy just may be the most amazing athlete to date in the world! In the 100 meter final, he shattered the world record in a blink-of-an-eye, blistering 9.68 seconds. More amazing is that he shut it down during the final fifteen meters and still shattered the record! By the way, they translated this race into a 3.56 second forty yard dash for you fantasy footballers out there. All I can say is OMG! In the 200 meter final, he ran basically unchallenged, although he did run all the way through finishing with another world record of 19.30 seconds, breaking what many experts felt was an unbreakable record set by Michael Johnson in Atlanta in 1996.
