Mid-Atlantic USGA Update

Adjust And Adapt

Managing golf course turf is about managing soil moisture. It is far better to be dry and have total control over the amount of water applied to maintain turf health. Conversely,

if it is wet, it is about soil drainage or just trying to dry the profile so the turf can survive the other elements that occur during the summer. In the Mid-Atlantic Region we have experienced conditions ranging from too much rain to a full- blown drought.



For example, this is advance week for the USGA Women's Open Championship at Oakmont CC. Over a seven-week period prior to the event, 10.5 inches of rain has fallen. Although Oakmont has had an abundance of rain, just east of Pittsburgh, down to and including most of the eastern half of this region, it has been very, very dry. In the central and eastern portions of the States of Pennsylvania, Virginia and West Virginia, dry conditions required intense water application to maintain turf growth. To maintain turf health, it is important to use water only where needed, and this often requires hand- held irrigation rather than indiscriminant application that affects playability and wastes water.

There are several strategies to dry moist soil profiles in greens. For the most part, it is about air and evaporation. At Oakmont this week, the greens were aerated six days before the first practice round. This decision was made by golf

course superintendent John Zimmers and supported by the Green Section staff. Small diameter (3 mm) solid tines were used, and the machine was adjusted to achieve a 3-inch depth. A tight spacing pattern was used to create as many holes as possible. The goal was to vent the soil to stimulate evaporation of excess soil moisture. Research has demonstrated that as little as a 3 mph breeze passing over the surface of the turf will produce an evaporative effect. Stimulating this effect and reducing soil moisture could mean the difference between minor turf stress and turf loss! This is a fine line, and at times there is little margin for error during harsh environmental conditions. (Note: Who said putting greens are never aerated prior to a tournament/championship?)

That's our final message. As the near record-breaking temperatures return next week, <u>BE CAREFUL</u> with water, close mowing, double cutting, heavy maintenance, and top-dressings. Don't stress the turf mechanically when it is already under environmental stress.



PGCSA Update

Good Morning Everyone!

As we all get prepared for the "dog days of summer", I wanted to update all of you on a few items related to the PGCSA.

First off, as you may recall back in November we agreed as a board to support the PGO and their lobbyist efforts. At that meetiing, we agreed to run our fiscal budget lean and use the majority of the incoming dues to pay for the lobbyist. Since that decision, we have had tremendous representation in Harrisburg. I am not sure if you are all aware of the issues surrounding the Chesapeake Bay Water Shed and President Obama's mandate to clean up the Bay in rather rapid time. Here is some info on the bay clean-up effort:

"President Obama signed an EO last May mandating quicker progress and putting into place aggressive nutrient and sediment reduction milestones for states around the CB. The EPA is currently developing a TMDL for the entire CB which should be completed by December. All of these actions/efforts will impact golf in the future.

Officials from the Chesapeake Bay Foundation have reached out to the turfgrass industry in Virginia. They want to know what the turfgrass industry can do to help speed up cleanup and recovery. And I suspect they will be reaching out to the turfgrass industry in your state as well. Golf will be lumped in with the Urban/Suburban sector which has been targeted as a significant source of pollution.

Chesapeake Bay cleanup efforts will be the model for future cleanup efforts across the US. At our meeting, we hope to get everyone up to speed on the issue and start to develop a coordinated golf industry response."

Since the GIS in San Diego, I have participated in several meeting in Harrisburg along with Scott Bishop our lobbyist and Jeff Broadbelt to defend our industry and profession. We have met with PA Senator Brubaker at his office, we have participated in the formation of the PA work group and we have met with the DEP specifically dealing with our sub-group to this effort, the Urban/Suburban work group. I can tell you that the efforts of Scott on our behalf has been amazing! To make a long story short, we are now in a position to help assist the DEP in writing the model for Pennsylvania when it comes to the TMDL (Total Maximum Daily Load) inputs by golf courses. With Scotts help, Jeff and I have stood in front of PA senators and the DEP to explain we are already stewards of the environment and not polluters. We are here to help and become leaders for this effort.

I know most of the state is not in the Chesapeake Bay Water Shed, but after sitting in these meetings, I can tell you these mandates by President Obama and the DEP will be state wide and affect all of us and how we manage our facilities. Our efforts are not going unnoticed, but we are against some "big hitters" such as AG and Landscapers. Thus far, we are in the front of the pack.

Next, I would ask all of you to start looking at your own facility and members of your local associations. We need everyone's BMP's (Best Management Practices) or nutrient management programs. We are at a stage with the DEP that they need front line practices we are all doing to manage our facilities. You may not realize it, but you are probably already doing these practices, they are just not documented. For example, how many of you have steams and buffer strips on your property? How many of you utilize slow release products to minimize loss? How many of you use 100% organics? Are there any of you that have no mow areas that reduce the amount of product applied to your facility? Does anyone utilize Reclaimed water? These are just a few of the items among a large list of others we need documentation for the DEP to make our case.


